# **OUR "WHY" IN ACTION**

### **THANKSGIVING & CHRISTMAS 2023**

We are thankful that even through the transition into our new building, we were able to still offer our holiday programs! Holidays are extremely stressful for those in need as the festivities require additional money that may not be available. We strive to relieve this financial burden and give families, especially children, some sense of normalcy and joy on those special days. These programs ensure that families in need will be able to celebrate like their neighbors, with a full stomach, family, and thankfulness! Our goal is always to serve a minimum of 100 families each holiday. We provide families in need with Thanksgiving boxes including all the sides for a typical



Thanksgiving meal, as well as a gift card to purchase a turkey (or protein of choice) at a local grocery store. Christmas bags include (6-8) age-appropriate gifts for all children including games, books, coloring books, crayons, puzzles, crafts, clothes, pajamas, and other toys. Each family receives a set of towels, warm blanket, and each adult receives a gift to ensure they have something to open on Christmas morning as well. This year instead of having families sign up for these programs in house, we partnered with MDHHS and received



the names of families in need. Because of YOUR generosity, **113** households (**369** individuals) were blessed with a full Thanksgiving meal to share with their loved ones! For Christmas, **98** families (**319** individuals—many of which were children) were blessed with a Christmas that was merry and bright with everyone in the household receiving gifts. Special thanks to our individual donors, First Presbyterian, Court Street United Methodist, Every Nation, St. Paul's Episcopal, The Whiting Foundation, Blue Cross Complete, Dort Financial, and HAP CareSource for making these programs possible!

#### CHILDREN'S BEDDING

One of our lesser known partnerships is one we have with MDHHS. You may have first heard about it back in 2018 when Tim Aumaugher spoke at our May Luncheon. We've now been working with them on this particular project for almost six years! Children are placed under the care and supervision of MDHHS by the courts. Did you know that there are currently over 450 children under MDHHS supervision in Genesee County? These children are placed either in relative homes, fictive kin homes, foster homes, or residential facilities, and whenever possible, they try to keep siblings together. The ultimate goal is to eventually reunify the children with their parents.

MDHHS is required to ensure that every child has their own bed to sleep in and purchases hundreds of beds and a great deal of bunk beds and cribs each year! Prior to Covid, the Michigan Department of Correction's Prison Build Program manufactured wooden bed frames for MDHHS. Unfortunately, the current price of lumber has made MDOC's frames a cost-prohibitive option. They are now utilizing a metal "mattress platform" frame for children with a durable, two sided mattress.

Here's where Crossover comes into play. Because of the collaboration we have with our friends from the NGA (National Giving Alliance), we are able to provide the pillows, blankets and sheet sets for the beds as the children are getting placed in their new home. Just like our other programs, we have already seen an increase in the amount of bedding we've provided this year. In the first two months of 2024, we have been able to uplift 44 children with new bedding as they transition and adjust to their new living space. We are thankful to be a partner in this amazing program.

# **We're Back!**

It's good to be back! On January 2nd, we officially reopened for client services and donations. We consider this more of a soft opening and look forward to celebrating our official Grand Reopening on April 8th! Because we anticipate a larger crowd for the event, we are hosting an open house from 11 a.m.—2 p.m. Refreshments will be available starting at noon, while staff and board members will be stationed throughout the space to share information about the new building.



Since reopening, we have already seen a drastic increase in numbers served for January and February. For food alone, we saw an increase of **35**% in January and **55**% in February! In two months, we've served 1,462 individuals with food, 1,486 individuals with personals, 984 people received gently used clothing, and 1,119 individuals took home cleaning supplies. Diving further into the statistics, we also found that **66**% of our clients these past two months, were brand new to Crossover! We are thankful to be back serving our neighbors in need.



Unlike our old facility, the new building has a community space which will be used for our community partners, regular support groups, meetings, classes, and provide a home for other nonprofits who may not have a place of their own. Examples of the classes we hope to have include recovery support, healthcare education, job training, nutrition, financial literacy and basic life skills. These resources will allow us to grow deeper relationships with our clients and go beyond the crisis needs of poverty. Our programs and classes are designed to educate our clients how to combat poverty in their own lives and eventually lead them to a self-sustaining life where they no longer need the assistance of Crossover. We have our first group meeting in the space on a weekly basis! The Flint Holistic

Recovery Community meets here every Wednesday at 6pm. FHRC was established with the intention of creating a safe space for holistic modalities and multiple pathways to coexist and be a community support for those in recovery. We've also been fortunate to have some of our community partners; Blue Cross Complete, FACT (Families and Children Together), and Hamilton Community Health on site, building relationships with our clients while also sharing information about the services they offer.

As Crossover continues to grow, this building is just the next step and a much needed addition to what we already do. It's a worthwhile and meaningful investment into the City of Flint, improving the corridor and providing a more robust community center for our neighbors in need. We are able to enhance our intake process, spend more time getting to know our clients, provide peer-to-peer mentorship, host more outreach events, and increase collaboration with other agencies in the community. For the next couple months we have a social work intern, her name is Harmoni, who's helping us get the peer-to-peer program up and running! It's an exciting time for Crossover with the best really yet to come!

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## HOW CROSSOVER GAVE HOPE IN 2023!

2023 may have looked a little different than years past as we transitioned into our new building but thanks to YOU we were still able to ensure that those struggling financially had a place to receive a helping hand.

- 3,273 people were blessed with personal hygiene products (shampoo, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant razors, toilet paper)
- 1,872 people were blessed with cleaning supplies (laundry detergent, antibacterial cleanser, dish soap, and scrubbies)
- 5,484 people received food in house and 3,518 people received food via mobile food giveaways!
- 3,939 people received gently used clothing
- 230 people were provided with household items for their new home
- 1,307 babies had clean diapers
- 273 people had a free ride home thanks to our bus pass program
- 110 families had a delicious Easter dinner and all the kids in the household received Easter baskets (322 kids)
- 33 children (16 to Junior Camp & 17 to Middle Camp) attended camp at Camp Chickigami
- 193 kids went Back to School with everything needed for success (new backpack, supplies, clothes, underwear, socks, shoes)
- 369 people had a traditional Thanksgiving feast through our Thanksgiving program
- 98 families (319 individuals—many of which were children) celebrated a Christmas that was merry & bright
- ♦ 88 kids received NEW winter coats plus six received NEW boots too!
- 69 kids received new bedding
